Transformer continues our ongoing FRAMEWORK Panel Series with FRAMEWORK Panel #19: The Art of Organizing — Artist Developed Models of Creative Engagement. This panel will profile a diverse range of artists' organizing models for creative engagement from across the country, and how these models influence the founders/organizers artistic practice (and/or vice versa - how artistic practices have informed organizing models). Panelists include: Kenneth Bailey, The Design Studio for Social Intervention (Boston, MA); Kristina Bilonick, Pleasant Plains Workshop (Washington, DC); Laura Hyatt, LAND, (Los Angeles, CA); Colin Kloecker, Works Progress (Minneapolis, MN); and George Scheer, Elsewhere (Greensboro, NC). The panel will be moderated by Tim Doud, Associate Professor of Art and Visiting Artist Program Coordinator, Studio Art Program in the Department of Art, American University (Washington, DC) and Victoria Reis, Co-Founder, Executive & Artistic Director, Transformer (Washington, DC).

Launched in December 2002, Transformer's FRAMEWORK Panel Series engages DC, national, and internationally based artists, arts professionals, cultural leaders, and DC audiences in conversation to create an oral 'field guide' to encourage and support individual emerging artists in our community, and to educate audiences through the sharing of best practices within the contemporary visual arts. FRAMEWORK Panels are presented 2-3 times per year in collaboration with a broad range of educational & cultural institution partners. Transformer's 2013/14 FRAMEWORK Panel Series is supported by the National Endowment for the Arts' Access to Artistic Excellence grant, "to encourage and support artistic excellence, preserve our cultural heritage, and provide access to the arts for all Americans."

FRAMEWORK Panel #19: The Art of Organizing – Artist Developed Models of Creative Engagement marks the launch of a new partnership between Transformer and AU's Studio Art Program in the Department of Art. Transformer's 11th Annual Silent Auction will take place at American University's Katzen Arts Center November 22, 2014. In 2015, Transformer in collaboration with American University's Studio Art Program in the Department of Art, will present the first of four Platforms exhibitions – a two-year, four exhibition series to be presented at American University's Katzen Art Center that will further highlight models being discussed in this panel. The discussion will be recorded.

ABOUT THE PANELISTS:

Kenneth Bailey is the Sector Organizing and Strategy Lead at The Design Studio for Social Intervention. (http://ds4si.org/approach/) The Design Studio for Social Intervention (DS4SI) is dedicated to changing how social justice is imagined, developed and deployed here in the United States. We are creating a design studio for

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the progressive arm of the nonprofit sector in order to support the sector's ability to create new forms of effective social intervention and the exploration of new ways to be interventionists.

Kristina Bilonick is an artist, arts administrator and entrepreneur. In 2010 she founded Pleasant Plains Workshop, (http://pleasantplainsworkshop.com) an arts incubator with a gallery & shop that showcases works by PPW resident artists as well as other DC-based artists. PPW also hosts a number of events such as poetry readings, skillshare sessions, critiques, and small group classes. Pleasant Plains Workshop offers studio space for 8 resident artists. PPW also engages with the community by being an active member of the Georgia Avenue Business Alliance and The Georgia Avenue Community Development Task Force. In 2011, PPW and the GACDTF co-founded the Georgia Avenue Window Walk- a public art project that pays local artists to install temporary art installations within storefront windows of both vacant and existing storefronts along Georgia Avenue.

Laura Hyatt has been the Development Director at LAND (Los Angeles Nomadic Division, www.nomadicdivision.org) since 2011. Hyatt manages all fundraising initiatives and outreach, as well as administration and management, social media initiatives, marketing strategies, and assists with artist and board liaising and special event coordination. LAND (Los Angeles Nomadic Division) is a non-profit art organization founded in 2009 as a public art initiative committed to curating site- and situation-specific contemporary art projects, in Los Angeles and beyond. LAND believes that everyone deserves the opportunity to experience innovative contemporary art in their day-to-day experience in order to develop new ideas and ways of thinking about their world. In turn, artists deserve the opportunity to realize projects, otherwise unsupported, in the public realm to present their unique ideas.

Colin Kloecker is an artist, designer and filmmaker whose work explores the intersection of civic engagement and artistic intervention. Works Progress (http://worksprogress.org) is a public art and design studio based in Minneapolis-St. Paul, Minnesota, founded in 2009. Led by artists Colin Kloecker and Shanai Matteson, Works Progress creates collaborative projects rooted in place and purpose. Through participatory public art, design, media and artist organizing Kloecker and Matteson catalyze relationships across creative and cultural boundaries, enabling new possibilities for artistic expression, civic engagement and participation in public life. Works Progress collaborates with an expansive network of artists, designers, issue experts, and community organizers to open space for everyday experiences to meet the ineffable.

George Scheer is the co-founder and director of Elsewhere. George is a writer, scholar, and artist who fosters creative communities at the intersection of aesthetics and social change. Sylvia's grandson, George leads organizational development and restoration of the historic property. George holds an MA in Critical Theory and Visual Culture from Duke University and a BA from the University of Pennsylvania in Political Communications. He is currently pursuing a PhD in Communication and Performance Studies at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill on the Cultural Economy of Art and Urban Development. Elsewhere is a living museum and artist residency set within a former thrift store housing one woman's 58-year collection of surplus and thrift. Elsewhere fosters more collaborative cultures by imagining new futures for old things. Elsewhere's museum, residency, education initiatives, and public works enliven and inspire Greensboro and the globe. http://goelsewhere.org
