Transformer FRAMEWORK Panel # 11: Convergence of Eastern & Western Art in a Globalized World

Transformer is very excited to be partnering with Studio Door China and the Meridian International Center in presenting our 11th panel in the on-going Transformer *FRAMEWORK Panel Series*. The *FRAMEWORK Panel Series* is designed to engage community leaders and artists in creating together a field guide to engage, stabilize, and support the individual emerging artist in our community.

This particular panel will explore the opportunities and challenges associated with the convergence of Eastern and Western art. With the globalization of the art world, and Eastern artists becoming more visible in the United States, our panelists - Shigeko Bork, Author, Curator, Art Dealer; Amaryllis Fox, Studio Door China; Carol Huh, Curator of Contemporary Art, Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery; and Jennifer Wen Ma, Artist/Curator – will examine:

- -- How do national identities and artistic traditions inform critical and curatorial approaches?
- -- What are the most serious hurdles to multi-lingual, multi-cultural conversation? Are they as simple as linguistics? As complex as politics?
- -- How does the dialogue between artist and viewer differ from country? What role is played by gallerists, governments, and museums?
- -- For Western collectors, when is it appropriate to seek more information about the historical, cultural, and political context of foreign movements? When, if ever, might imposition of Western analysis prove beneficial?

The panel, which will start promptly at 6:30pm, will be moderated by Transformer Board Member Allison G. Marvin, Art Consultant, Sightline; Art Lawyer, Law Office of Allison G. Marvin. Opening remarks will be given by Dr. Curtis Sandberg, Vice President for Arts and Cultural Programs, Meridian International Center.

Launched in December 2002, Transformer's **FRAMEWORK Panel Series** is designed to engage artists, arts professionals, cultural leaders, and audiences in conversation to create an oral "field

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guide" to encourage and support individual emerging artists in our community, while also educating audiences, through the sharing of best practices within the contemporary art field. Presented two-three times per year, previous FRAMEWORK panel topics have included: The Importance of the Curator, Financial Stabilization and Economic Opportunities for Artists, The Role of Community Organizations in Supporting Emerging Artists, Artist as Activist, The Role of the Arts Writer: Critiquing Arts Criticism, Collecting the Work of Emerging Artists, Art School Confidential: Rethinking Art Education, and Underexposed: Self-Publishing Your Photo Book.
